Dear Residents:

We continue to work with the USPS on various issues and concerns regarding our local Post Office. The USPS has decided to conduct a full examination of our Post Office operations. The examination will include a thorough analysis of the current practices, while looking for potential options to address our concerns. It will also involve an analysis of carrier routes and costs. A full examination takes a fair amount of effort and time, so as always, your patience is greatly appreciated. Also, to ensure that only the most accurate information is communicated, we will wait for official responses from USPS authorities before disseminating decisive information.

There are a couple of items I can address at this time... 1) We have not been able to identify an era when there was a general mail delivery service to individual residences within the Village. 2) Village Ordinance 140 of 1999 prohibits the placement of personal property within the Village street right-of-way. The ordinance is **not** the reason we do not have residential mail delivery in town. The only "mailboxes" affected by the ordinance were for newspaper deliveries. 3) Our new permanent Postmaster is here! Mr. Michael Riley comes to us from the Webberville Post Office and I ask you to join me in giving Michael a warm welcome to our community. 4) Please be reminded that it is **very important** to get your PO Box number on all your mail and packages.

The PW Girls basketball team came within one game of making their second consecutive appearance in the state finals. The team suffered their only loss of the season to eventual state champion Detroit Edison. Congratulations to the girls and coach Steve Eklund on a tremendous season.
